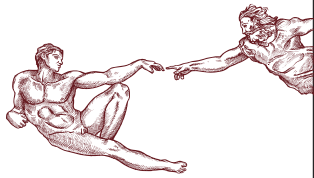

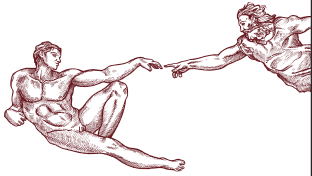

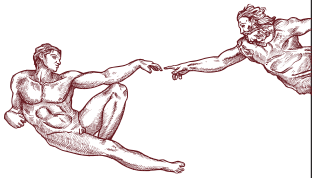

The courses and worksites are the Institute's flagship and are a sure and proven pathway into the professional markets.

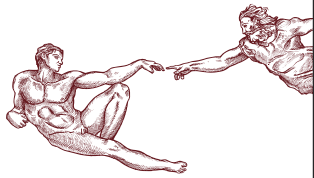

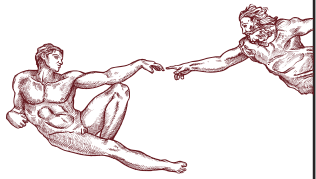
All this, thanks to a careful didactic planning, in close collaboration with companies of various sectors, in order to create immediately a link with the

Restoration interventions by our students at the Church of Santa Maria in Traspontina in Rome

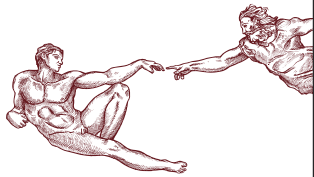

To achieve this goal, IRR students receive a theoretical preparation in the historical-humanistic and technological-scientific fields, related to a practical preparation that provides, for each year of the course, an activity of restoration laboratory. The guidance of the laboratories is entrusted to experienced teachers-restorers or professionals who work in prestigious Institutes for the Conservation of Cultural Heritage or in private organizations. The course is held in Rome, has a legal duration of 5 years and avails itself of the support and collaboration of prestigious institutional partners.

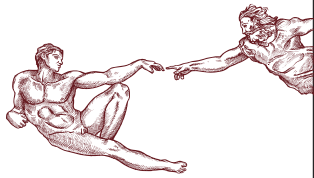

Professional profile

The cultural heritage restorer performs all direct and indirect operations aimed at containing the processes of deterioration of goods of historical and artistic interest and ensuring their preservation.

They work on artefacts, aware of their aesthetic and documentary value, and integrate manual expertise with technical skills that enable them to carry out actions according to both traditional and innovative intervention methods.

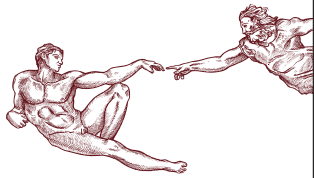
They can act as works managers and carry out surveys to document the state of conservation of the piece and the work phases. They are responsible for organising the work and preparing the technology and products required for the intervention; they collaborate in the transport and relocation of artefacts.

They work in companies, craftsmen's workshops and cooperatives, in the building sector, on valuable architectural structures and on movable goods

protected as cultural heritage, for which a conservation project is envisaged; they may work on projects commissioned by collectors, public or private bodies, on a self-employed or independent basis.

Competencies



Ministerial Decree n. 86 of 26 May 2009 sets out the **Competence Profiles of restorers** and of all other operators carrying out complementary activities to restoration, pursuant to paragraph 7 of Article 29 of the Code of Cultural Heritage and Landscape.

Art. 1 of the Cultural Heritage Restorer states that: "The restorer of movable cultural heritage and of decorated surfaces of architectural heritage, subject to the protection provisions of the Code, is the professional who defines the state of conservation and implements a complex of direct and indirect actions to limit the processes of degradation of the constituent materials of the assets and ensure their preservation, safeguarding their cultural value. To this end, within the framework of a coherent and coordinated conservation planning, the restorer analyses the data relating to the constituent materials, the technique of execution and the state of conservation of the goods and interprets them; the restorer plans and directs, for the part within their competence, the interventions; directly carries out conservation and restoration treatments; directs and coordinates

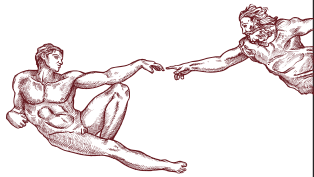
other operators who carry out complementary activities to restoration. They carry out research, experimentation and didactic activities in the field of conservation".

The Graduate in Cultural Heritage Restoration is competent in:

- **Organisation and planning of work and management of resources**
- **Methods and procedures of graphic and photographic documentation**
- **Recognition of the historical and artistic characteristics of artefacts**
- **Recognition of alterations - implementation of procedures to remove the causes of degradation**
- **Restoration of supports and materials**
- **Consolidation methods and products**
- **Restoration of structural continuity of artefacts**
- **Restoration of aesthetic interpretation**
- **Protection and maintenance programming**

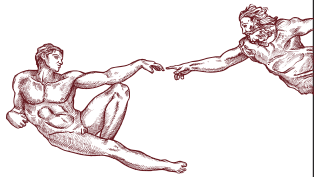

Academic Calendar and Information for Trainees

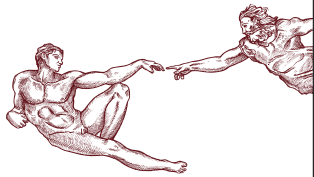
In order to provide a more balanced distribution of study loads, the annual academic calendar is specifically published on the Institute's portal.

Organisational Elements, Fees and Contributions



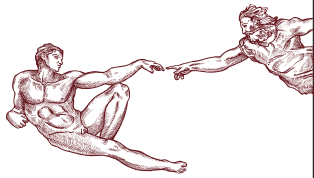
- 40 places available, based on successful completion of the entrance examination.
- Admission qualification: high school diploma or equivalent qualification if obtained abroad
- Beginning of degree course: October
- Duration: five years
- Frequency: five days a week
- Title awarded: Diploma equivalent to a Master's Degree in Conservation and Restoration of Cultural Heritage (LMR/O2)

- Fees and contributions:
 - Annual fee: € 5.000,00

The fee can be paid in instalments as follows:

- Registration fee: € 1.000.00
- N. 8 instalments of € 500,00 due respectively by the 5th of each month from November, December 2024, January, February, March, April, May, June 2025
- Di.S.U. regional tax. : € 140,00

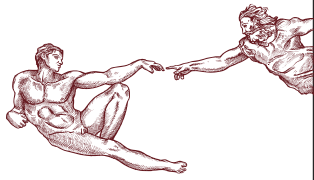

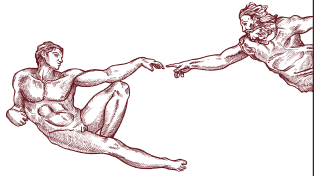

Artistic and cultural heritage

Italy has the greatest artistic and cultural heritage in the world, estimated at around 3500 museums, 2000 archaeological sites, 20000 historical centres, 40000 fortresses and castles, 95000 churches and 30000 historical residences.

Despite the wealth of this national heritage, public spending on cultural assets is still very low (less than 0.5% of the Gross Domestic Product), but it is certainly destined to increase with a view to relaunching and investing in this unique wealth as a key resource for the country's development.

Currently, the vast majority of resources for the protection and conservation of the artistic and cultural heritage come from public funding (EU, State, Municipalities, Regions and Provinces) and only a small part is borne by private individuals who, in the future, will certainly be called upon to play an increasingly incisive role as patrons.

A fundamental role in this sector is played by ecclesiastical bodies, which, with their churches, convents, libraries and the like, account for almost 80% of Italy's cultural assets.

Graduates in Conservation and Restoration of Cultural Heritage can work in intellectual, scientific and highly specialised professions, as well as functions

Areas of activity for graduates

and operational roles of high responsibility in the fields of research, protection, promotion and management of historical and artistic heritage, aiming at the preservation, cultural and scientific enhancement and the dissemination and promotion of historical and artistic assets. In particular, the main areas of activity in the sector concern:

Protection and preservation of cultural assets

- restoration and recovery of works of art
- conservator, curator or official in public institutions (after exceeding the competition with access to roles) such as superintendencies, museums and galleries, public and territorial bodies or private law institutions or bodies such as private foundations
- cataloguing
- documentation
- archiving
- maintenance

Duties of professional responsibility in public and private entities

- archives
- libraries
- provincial and municipal museums
- Local entities
- foundations
- research centers and institutes responsible for the protection, conservation and management of archaeological, artistic and archival heritage

Development of heritage and access to culture

- valorisation and dissemination of cultural activities
- planning and implementation of exhibitions, cultural events and shows, museum and exhibition installations and itineraries, both permanent and temporary, management of related editorial productions and planning and management of educational activities
- drafting of illustrative and educational materials
- access to private publishing, advertising, information and multimedia communication companies specialising in the historical, artistic and architectural field
- access to private marketing and communication companies
- admission to the tour guide public exam for an institute, agency or cultural centre offering this type of service.

Research

- researching, studying, cataloguing and filing works of art for conservation institutions and the art market
- consultancy for estimates and expert opinions for the evaluation, identification and promotion of works of art and artists
- scientific and cultural management of projects

Support activities

- Administrative direction and management
- custody and security

The latter activities, although similar to those carried out in other sectors, take on specific characteristics in the field of cultural heritage.

Further studies

- access, after passing the admission tests, to the specific Schools of Specialisation in Historical and Artistic Heritage for the training of managers of the Ministry of Cultural Heritage and Activities and of Public Museums and Galleries
- access to second-level university Master's degrees and to the third-level training cycle related to research (Doctorate)
- access to training courses for teaching art history in secondary schools.



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
